(IS JUST NOT LONG ENOUGH)

Frederick Douglass, In Life and Times of Frederick Douglass, credits Louise Dorsey, for giving him the courage "to face down [racial] hostility and attend President [Abraham] Lincoln's inauguration in 1865." Dr. Roger Lane. William Dorsey's Philadelphia and Ours: On the Past and Future of the Black City in America [1991].

"Colored children should be taught by their own." Caroline R. LeCount [n.d.]

Historians Roger Lane* and David W. Blight* both recount the participation of Frederick Douglass and Louise Dorsey during Lincoln's second inaugural events. Douglass remembered how he and Louise Dorsey, St. Thomas parishioner and wife of successful caterer Thomas J. Dorsey, were awaiting Lincoln's address when he saw Lincoln point him out to Vice President Andrew Johnson. Blight suggests that Johnson, inebriated, responded to Lincoln displaying what Douglass interpreted as "bitter contempt." Afterwards, Lane writes, Douglass decided to challenge racial custom and go to the White House to congratulate the President. Seemingly, Mrs. Dorsey, who possibly helped Douglass secure introductions and housing in Washington, D.C., was his only wiling companion. "[T]ogether," Douglass said, they "joined in the grand procession of citizens from all parts of the country [moving] slowly towards the executive mansion." At the White House, however, they were prohibited from entering until another guest alerted Lincoln about Douglass' predicament. Douglass said that with Lincoln's intervention "Mrs. Dorsey and I walked into the spacious East Room, amid a scene of elegance ... never witnessed before." It was then that Lincoln, seeing Douglass, greeted him and asked for his opinion of the inaugural address saying "... there is no man in the country whose opinion I value more ..." to which Douglass replied "Mr. Lincoln, that was a sacred effort." Blight writes that the inaugural speech "left Douglass breathless," that he regarded it more "like a sermon," and was "stunned by its biblical foundations."

St. Thomas member Caroline Rebecca LeCount** – denied a seat on a streetcar in 1867 because of her race – forced a local magistrate to uphold a law passed by the Pennsylvania legislature that outlawed racial segregation on streetcars. Her fiancée, Octavius Catto, had worked with Frederick Douglass recruiting Black soldiers for the Union cause. Catto had also galvanized support for the public transit desegregation law.

LeCount, like Catto, was a graduate of the Institute for Colored Youth (now Cheyney University). Also like Catto, she had been valedictorian of her class. She embarked on a career as an educator and an equal rights activist. As a school principal LeCount advocated for the equal treatment of Black educators and championed their unique role in educating Black children.

*Dr. Roger Lane is Professor Emeritus of History at Haverford College. With the permission of Fr. Robert E. DuBose, Jr. Dr. Lane used the AECST archives while doing research for his book. Dr. David W. Blight, author of the acclaimed Frederick Douglass: Prophet of Freedom, is the 1954 Professor of American History and the Director of the Gilder Lehrman Center for the Study of Slavery, Resistance, and Abolition at Yale University.

** Rename Taney Street as LeCount Street(renametaney.com) seeks to rename Taney Street after Caroline LeCount. Taney Street was named in 1858 after Supreme Court Chief Justice Roger B. Taney, author of the decision in the Dred Scott case that held that African Americans were "altogether unfit to associate with the white race, either in social or political relations; and so far inferior, that they had no rights which the white man was bound to respect; and that the negro might justly and lawfully be reduced to slavery for his benefit." The group is also seeking to erect a headstone on Caroline LeCount's grave in Eden Cemetery. **From the Rector:** Whoever you may be and however you may find yourself experiencing life's journey, do know that St. Thomas Church welcomes you.



I am a resident of your district and am writing to you to request that you work to pass legislation to ban assault weapons in the state of Pennsylvania. To quote the study by Roth and Koper cited below, "Assault weapons are disproportionately involved in murders with multiple victims, multiple wounds per victim, and police officers as victims." To protect Pennsylvanians from mass shootings in which assault weapons are likely to be used, and to protect law enforcement whose body armor does not always protect them from assault weapon fire, please join the other US states including New York, New Jersey, and Maryland, who are passing assault weapon bans.

As a Christian and a member of the Schuylkill Deanery of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, a group of Episcopal churches in West Philadelphia, this issue is a matter of faith for me, of loving my neighbor as myself. West Philly is facing an epidemic of gun violence, and I hope you will work on our behalf to address this important issue.

Assault weapon bans have been proven to be effective. The 1994 Assault Weapons Ban reduced crime and got these military-style weapons off our streets. Since the ban expired, hundreds of people have been killed or injured by these weapons.

- A Justice Department study of the assault weapons ban found that it was responsible for a 6.7% decrease in total gun murders, holding all other factors equal.

- The use of assault weapons in crime declined by more than two-thirds by about nine years after 1994

We are asking for legislation to ban the sale, transfer, manufacture, and importation of:

 All semiautomatic rifles that can accept a detachable magazine and have at least one military feature: pistol grip; forward grip; folding, telescoping, or detachable stock; grenade launcher or rocket launcher; barrel shroud; or threaded barrel. All semiautomatic pistols that can accept a detachable magazine and have at least one military feature: threaded barrel; second pistol grip; barrel shroud; capacity to accept a detachable magazine at some location outside of the pistol grip; or semiautomatic version of an automatic firearm.

All semiautomatic rifles and handguns with a fixed magazine with the capacity to accept more than 10 rounds.

All semiautomatic shotguns that have a folding, telescoping, or detachable stock; pistol grip; fixed magazine with the capacity to accept more than 5 rounds; ability to accept a detachable magazine; forward grip; grenade launcher or rocket launcher; or shotgun with a revolving cylinder.

All ammunition feeding devices (magazines, strips, and drums) capable of accepting more than 10 rounds.

erstand that such legislation would not include any weapon that is lawfully possessed at the date of the bill's ; any firearm manually operated by a bolt, pump, lever or slide action; assault weapons used by military, law ment, and retired law enforcement and antique weapons. The legislation should also protect legitimate and sporting rifles and shotguns.

islation should be written to strengthen the 1994 Assault Weapons Ban and state bans by:

Moving from a 2-characteristic test to a 1-characteristic test.

 Making the ban harder to evade by eliminating the easy-to-remove bayonet mounts and flash suppressors from the characteristics test.

Banning dangerous aftermarket modifications and workarounds such as ump or slide fire stocks, so-called "bullet buttons" that allow the rapid replacement of ammunition magazines, and thumbhole stocks, a type of stock that was created as a workaround to avoid prohibitions on pistol grips.

Adding a ban on the importation of assault weapons and large-capacity magazines.
