**March 22** - Remember the Sabbath Day and keep it holy. You shall not invoke with malice the Name of the Lord your God.

March 29 - You shall not make for yourself any idol. I am the Lord your God who brought you out of bondage. You shall have no other gods but me.

### **LENTEN GLOSSARY OF TERMS**

Why we don't say Alleluia during Lent: Alleluia comes to us from Hebrew, and it means "praise Yahweh". This praise has a joyful overtone to it and we use it especially during happy celebrations. While we do praise God all year round, during Lent we withhold a bit of our joy and happiness because of the season's penitential and sorrowful character. After all, we are anticipating Jesus' very passion and death.

In order to emphasize the penitential nature of that journey, the Church, during Lent, removes the Alleluia from the Mass. We no longer sing with the choirs of angels; instead, we acknowledge our sins and practice repentance so that one day we may again have the privilege of worshiping God as the angels do.

Palm Sunday is the Sunday before Easter. It commemorates Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, and in many Christian churches, Palm Sunday is marked by the distribution of Palm leaves.

Maundy Thursday is the Thursday before Easter that commemorates the Last Supper of Jesus Christ with the apostles, The significance is derived from Latin mandatum (a new commandment I give unto you, that you love one another as I have loved you), the statement Jesus made in John 13:34 by which He explained to the apostles the significance of His action of washing their feet.

**Good Friday** ("good" meaning pious or holy) is the Friday of Holy Week, observed primarily by Christians commemorating the crucifixion of Jesus Christ and His death at Calvary.

**Holy Saturday** is the day before Easter and the day of Holy Week in which Christians prepare for Easter. It commemorates the day that Jesus Christ's body was laid in the tomb.

**Triduum** (TRID-uh-wum) is the period of three days that begins the evening of Maundy Thursday and ends the evening of Easter Sunday. It recalls the passion, burial and resurrection of Jesus.



I am a resident of your district and am writing to you to request that you work to pass legislation to ban assault weapons in the state of Pennsylvania. To quote the study by Roth and Koper cited below, "Assault weapons are disproportionately involved in murders with multiple victims, multiple wounds per victim, and police officers as victims." To protect Pennsylvanians from mass shootings in which assault weapons are likely to be used, and to protect law enforcement whose body armor does not always protect them from assault weapon fire, please join the other US states including New York, New Jersey, and Maryland, who are passing assault weapon bans.

As a Christian and a member of the Schuylkill Deanery of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, a group of Episcopal churches in West Philadelphia, this issue is a matter of faith for me, of loving my neighbor as myself. West Philly is facing an epidemic of gun violence, and I hope you will work on our behalf to address this important issue.

Assault weapon bans have been proven to be effective. The 1994 Assault Weapons Ban reduced crime and got these military-style weapons off our streets. Since the ban expired, hundreds of people have been killed or injured by these weapons.

- A Justice Department study of the assault weapons ban found that it was responsible for a 6.7% decrease in total gun murders, holding all other factors equal.

We are asking for legislation to ban the sale, transfer, manufacture, and importation of:

 All semiautomatic rifles that can accept a detachable magazine and have at least one military feature: pistol grip; forward grip; folding, telescoping, or detachable stock; grenade launcher or rocket launcher; barrel shroud; or threaded barrel. All semiautomatic pistols that can accept a detachable magazine and have at least one military feature: threaded barrel; second pistol grip; barrel shroud; capacity to accept a detachable magazine at some location outside of the pistol grip; or semiautomatic version of an automatic firearm.

All semiautomatic rifles and handguns with a fixed magazine with the capacity to accept more than 10 rounds.

All semiautomatic shotguns that have a folding, telescoping, or detachable stock; pistol grip; fixed magazine with the capacity to accept more than 5 rounds; ability to accept a detachable magazine; forward grip; grenade launcher or rocket launcher; or shotgun with a revolving cylinder.

All ammunition feeding devices (magazines, strips, and drums) capable of accepting more than 10 rounds.

erstand that such legislation would not include any weapon that is lawfully possessed at the date of the bill's ; any firearm manually operated by a bolt, pump, lever or slide action; assault weapons used by military, law ment, and retired law enforcement and antique weapons. The legislation should also protect legitimate and sporting rifles and shotguns.

islation should be written to strengthen the 1994 Assault Weapons Ban and state bans by:

Moving from a 2-characteristic test to a 1-characteristic test.

 Making the ban harder to evade by eliminating the easy-to-remove bayonet mounts and flash suppressors from the characteristics test.

Banning dangerous aftermarket modifications and workarounds such as ump or slide fire stocks, so-called "bullet buttons" that allow the rapid replacement of ammunition magazines, and thumbhole stocks, a type of stock that was created as a workaround to avoid prohibitions on pistol grips.

Adding a ban on the importation of assault weapons and large-capacity magazines.
